### Mango Popsicle Dwarf Poker

Delicious spikes bloom continuously throughout summer and into fall. Drought tolerant. Perennial. Full sun. Zone: 5 - 10



**Angel Red® Pomegranate**  
Zone: 7 - 11

Simply the best pomegranate on the market! Less pulp and higher juice content than others. 10 ft. tall and wide. Full sun.



**Double Take Orange™ Flowering Quince**  
Zone: 5 - 9

Double flowers in early spring. Thornless! 4 ft. tall and wide. Partial to full sun.



**Sundown Big Sky™ Series Coneflower**  
Zone: 4 - 9

Fragrant flowers on thick stems ideal for cut flower arrangements. Perennial. Full sun.







### Tangerine Beauty Crossvine

Zone: 6 – 9

Vigorous, woody vine provides an abundance of stunning, tangerine-colored blooms over a long season. Full sun.



### Columbus Montbretia

Zone: 6 – 10

Excellent yellow/orange cut flower and adds dramatic impact to any border, and draws butterflies into the garden. Full sun.



### Butterfly Weed

Zone: 4 – 9

N. American native that earns its name, drawing in butterflies by the dozens. Hardy, free-flowering, and well-behaved. Full sun.



### Belgian Hybrid Orange Bush Lily

Zone: 9 – 11

Wider and shorter leaves, but still produces clusters of up to 60 vivid flowers on tall stems. Perennial. Full to partial shade.



### Garvinea Kendall® Gerber Daisy

Zone: 7 – 10

Long-lasting, brilliant, prolific flowers from early spring until the first frost. Herbaceous perennial. Partial to full sun.



### Tropicanna® Canna

Zone: 7 – 11

Exotic foliage and tall stems crowned by large, bright orange blooms. Pair with purples for pow! Perennial. Full sun.
